**Chesapeake Chapter
Board Meeting Minutes
January 26, 2003**

The Chesapeake Chapter Board Meeting with the new board was held at Brick Ridge Inn in Mt. Airy, Maryland. John Tokar called the meeting to order and welcomed all the officers and said he felt we had a good group and that we would be able to work together. We hope to make BCD the best yet, and we will cooperate with other clubs.

There was a discussion about the Tech Advisor position since Randy Kegg had resigned. Since Glenn Abbott was the remaining person on the ballot, it was decided that he would be appointed our new Tech Advisor.

New Business

By-Laws – a committee was established to revise the By-Laws. Mike Hughes was appointed Chairman of the committee. Committee members are John Van Over,

Jane Snider, Steve Woodall, and Ralph Cattaneo. Mike Hughes indicated that he would ask Randy Kegg to be on the committee. John provided copies of the by-laws from three other car clubs to use as reference material. The committee will develop a new set of by-laws that will be tailored to meet the needs of our club. They will try to have the by-laws ready by Mini GOF.

By Board decision, British Car Day will be held again this year at Smokey Glen Farm. John Tokar and Lin Snider met with senior management at Smokey Glen Farm and they assured us that the food problem would be corrected. There will be more lines; more cashiers and desserts will be in a separate line. Also, early morning snacks and coffee will be made available. They will furnish extra staff to help with car parking, spectator parking and traffic flow. SGF will not charge extra for this help. It was suggested that we try to get help from a high school band booster group or some other school organization that would be interested in earning some money. It was mentioned that a set dollar guaranteed donation could be provided to the charity in return for help with various BCD activities.

It was brought up about paying SGF \$6,000 and the Chesapeake Chapter only cleared \$245.95. A projected income analysis, which included raising the registration fees, was presented showing how we could make more money this year. The first year we didn't expect to clear much because of the new location and date change. Some other places for BCD were suggested.

Montgomery Fair Grounds would need an environmental study and \$3,750 to \$4,750. Little Seneca Lodge has 20 acres and they charge \$1,000 for four hours and they cannot guarantee that we would be the only group using the facilities. Ft. Smallwood charges \$2,000 but it was not an acceptable place. When SGF rents to private parties they charge \$16,000 for the day. Since we scheduled our event on Father's Day, we are renting the facility at a discounted rate. We have received letters from other clubs stating what a nice show it was at SGF. Three clubs offered to help us with BCD as needed.

Club Newsletter – Steve Woodall is the new Newsletter Editor and he wants the newsletter to be available on the computer web site. He will put out one newsletter with the Internet address and web site and update information weekly. BCD information and registration forms, as well as and club membership applications will also be available on the web. It was discussed that some people do not have computers and some would like to have a hard copy mailed. Nancy and Steve will work at getting hard copy newsletters to those not on the Internet. It was mentioned that other clubs send their Newsletters out and post them on their web sites.

Schedule of Chapter Events

Winter Eat Out - will be on February 23rd at Gabriel's and it was discussed the club should not subsidize the cost of the Brunch. It was mentioned that the Brunch is subsidized because most of the people that attend are the BCD workers and that it is a thank you to them. It was decided that the amount the members will pay would be \$20.00 each. Therefore the amount the club subsidizes will be less. This will save the club money.

Mini GOF - will be in Strasburg, Virginia on May 2-4. Martha read the brochure that will be in the Newsletter (see expanded article at the end of this newsletter!) . Lots to see and do in Strasburg. After the car show we will go to Billy Thompson's White Post Restoration Shop. Hotel rates are \$79.00. You must register at the hotel by April 1st to get the Chesapeake Chapter rate.

British Car Day: - will be held at Smokey Glen Farm on Father's Day June 15, 2003. The same venue at last year will be followed, with a major improvement in food and drink service.

Fall Foliage Tour: - will be held at the Hughes' cabin in Monterey, Virginia on October 10-12. Highland Inn reservations are to be made ASAP (by March 1). Call 540-468-2143 and mention the Chesapeake Chapter. (see details below: Ed.)

We hope to have another board meeting soon. Since it was snowing, the meeting was adjourned because the roads were becoming snow covered.

1 June: The Second Annual celebration of British Car Week in Southern Maryland will take place at Little Cove Farm in Saint Leonard, MD. on Sunday, June 1st, 2003. We again invite the entire British Car community to take a pleasant drive in the lovely Southern Maryland countryside and join us for a relaxed, free-form picnic with other LBC (Little British Car) owners and their families. And on your way down you're also welcome to participate in "**The Great Patuxent Valley Rallye**" which will start that morning near Upper Marlboro, MD. and end at the farm front gate.

The main event is a picnic at the farm, and all are invited to pack family and/or pets aboard, bring whatever they may want to eat, drink and play with, and come out for a day of fun and fellowship with others who enjoy driving and owning vintage vehicles. We learned a lot from last year's inaugural event, and this year we will be setting up large tents and picnic tables to provide shade and comfortable seating. We'll also have more to do and enjoy: Live music, hayrides, nature walks, etc. If you're coming directly to the picnic, arrive anytime after 10:00 A.M.

Technical Talk

Winter "T" Storage

There are T. V. shows about Backyard Mechanic, Shade Tree Mechanic, tune-up specialists, Classic Car Mechanics, all sharing special tools and equipment of the latest design. On November 17, 2002 we had 10 members of our club members attend a Tech Session at Ralphie's Garage on Winter "T" Storage.

Those in attendance were treated to presentations from Ralph Cattanio and John Tokar on suggested steps to take as we put our "T" cars to bed for the winter. Refreshments were also served.



Below are the suggested steps that can be used to store your "T" for the winter. These suggestions can be applied to many vehicles that need winter storage.

Things you will need to buy are oil & filter, Marvel Mystery Oil, fuel stabilizer, WD-40, antifreeze, cooling system flush and cooling system treatment, mothballs and Beer!!!

1. Pour the coolant flush into your radiator. Take the fuel stabilizer and a rag with you to the gas station. Drive your "T" for about two to three miles and stop at your local gas station. Before topping off with 93 octane, pour in the fuel stabilizer.
2. Drive back home and change the oil and filter first.
3. You are ready to flush the cooling system. Drain the radiator and engine block. Fill the radiator with water and run the engine for about five minutes. Drain the radiator and block again. Install the proper mix of antifreeze and water along with the coolant treatment.
4. Drain the transmission and refill.
5. Drain the differential and refill.
6. Lube the front end, steering rack, drive shaft distributor shaft and water pump.

7. Remove the air filters. With your oil can spray into the carburetor the Marvel Mystery Oil to fog the engine. You will need help to hold the idle up @1500 RPM'S as you do this. Let the engine run for about one minute and turn the engine off. Remove the spark plugs and shoot Marvel Mystery Oil into each cylinder. Reinstall the plugs to proper torque.

8. Loosen the generator and back off the fan belt.

9. Remove the battery from the car. Put the battery on a slow charge for about six hours. Store on a block of wood and recharge the battery in about two months.

10. Spray the distributor cap and ignition wires with WD-40. Also spray the fuse box.

items are very corrosive and will play havoc on your body and electrical system.



Body Prep:

Be sure to wash and wax your car body (and chrome) to ensure a protective coat for the winter. Buff all wax off now and use only soft 100% cotton rags.

Interior Prep:

Clean and vacuum the interior carpets. Treat your leather seats with leather conditioner and vinyl trim with vinyl protector. Ensure that the hood is in the upright position and that the side curtains are in place. This will keep these components in the open air to prevent mold and mildew as well as keep unwelcome rodents from nesting in your car over the winter. Mothballs in small plastic dishes will also prevent rodents and other critters from taking up residence. Silica gel drying agent (purchased from a hardware store) set in a plastic pan will aid in controlling any moisture buildup that may occur during storage.

Tires:

If you have the original bias-ply tires, please take note: Your sidewalls will probably be cracked from dry rot. This condition can be

Other General Storage Notes:

If possible, store your car in a garage with a dry concrete floor. Dirt floors are bad because they will emit water vapor that will collect under your car and will cause condensation damage leading to rust. If your only alternative is a barn, use a plastic tarp to serve as a vapor barrier between the earth and your car! Use a soft cotton car cover for inside storage. Blue tarps are a no-no! Also be sure and store your car away from fertilizer and other chemicals. These

a dangerous situation that could cause your tires to fail without warning leading to catastrophic results. Replace them ASAP! Over inflate your tires by 5 PSI because when your car sits idle your tires will loose air. There is no need to block your car if you have recently purchased radial tires because they are made from modern rubber materials (flat spots will not develop).

Suspension:

If you block your car do so under the suspension (springs or A-Arms) not the chassis. Allowing the suspension to hang loose puts it in an un-natural position that could lead to problems later. Set the gearbox in 1st. gear and block the rear wheels. Do not set the hand brake as it could cause the brake shoes to rust to the drums making Spring start-up rather challenging!

Misc Items:

Plug the end of the exhaust pipe using a wood dowel or duct tape to prevent infestation. It is also a good idea to seal the engine air intakes. Don't use rags because they make ideal nesting materials for your rodent friends!

One last thing is to make a list of what you've done, and what should be un-done when you awaken your car in the Spring. This will help make the experience all the more enjoyable!

We hope that this exercise has been helpful to all. If you have any questions, Ralph and John would be glad to answer them. Classic Autosport magazine will offer classic car enthusiasts more depth in its technical coverage and a wider range of classic performance automobile coverage – British, as well as European, American, and others. Classic Autosport will be all-color, perfect-bound and will start with at least 100 pages.

In making the announcement, Tim Suddard, president of Motorsport Marketing and publisher of Grassroots Motorsports, said "As classic car enthusiasts ourselves, we have had a dream for over ten years of adding a classic car magazine to our activities. With the acquisition of British Car, we have the core around which to create the kind of magazine we have always wanted ourselves, in the same way we have built Grassroots Motorsports."

From his office in Los Altos, California, Gary Anderson, editor and publisher of British Car Magazine since 1996 said "I'm really looking forward to editing the new magazine. With the strong technical and publishing resources of Motorsport Marketing, we'll be able to provide more detailed information on our favorite British cars while covering the other marques that were so much a part of the sports car hobby as we knew it in the fifties, sixties, and seventies."

The expanded magazine will give British Car readers more tech features, emphasizing ways to improve reliability, safety, and performance of classic cars. In addition, Classic Autosport will be building its own project cars like those that Grassroots Motorsports is famous for building. Classic car meet and vintage racing coverage will be expanded. All of this will be added while the magazine will still maintain the enthusiasm for classic cars that British Car readers have come to expect.

The first project cars planned for the new publication include an MG Midget and Porsche 911, while the magazine will also campaign a pair of vintage racers: Publisher Tim Suddard will continue to run his Triumph TR3 at East Coast events, while Editor Gary Anderson will campaign an MGA on the West Coast.

The April/May issue of British Car will be the last one to carry the old name and logo. British Car readers will see no interruption of service, as they will be the first to receive this new and expanded publication. The first issue of Classic Autosport will be mailed in late May and on the newsstands by 3 June.

Five Speed Conversions

If you have ever undertaken a long trip in your classic MG, you will agree that on modern roads the comparatively low overall gearing can be a major drawback. At 70 MPH the engine is turning about 4100 rpm which causes excessive engine wear, noise, and driver fatigue from unwanted vibration. With the Five-Speed kit you can cruise at 70 MPH at a more relaxing 3300 rpm. Less engine wear, better gas mileage, and full synchronized shifting are some of the benefits.

The conversion adapts a Ford Sierra Type 9 five-speed gearbox which has been fully reconditioned and tested. The conversion is non intrusive to the MGA & MGB with only

slight modification to the TD & TF models. The car can be returned to original condition very easily.

The standard ratios for the Ford Sierra gearbox are perfect for the MG models, with a 10% higher second gear for better overtaking. Fourth gear is exactly the same as the MGs and fifth gear matches the MGB overdrive exactly.

The bell housing is cast in high strength LM25TF heat-treated aluminum alloy and is robustly constructed. The standard clutch cover, release lever and slave cylinder are all reused. A suitable clutch plate is provided if needed. The kit comes with everything you need to complete the conversion. With different models there are different needs for the kits. Each kit is made specific for the individual's needs.

For those who wish to have a little better performing car, especially in the mountains, there is a close ratio gearbox available that closes up the gap between 2nd and 3rd gears. Also available is a shifter using a PTFE bearing which gives a smooth shorter shift than the standard Sierra gearbox. The conversion kits can be fitted to the MGA, MGB, ZA & ZB Magnette, MGTD, and the MGTF.

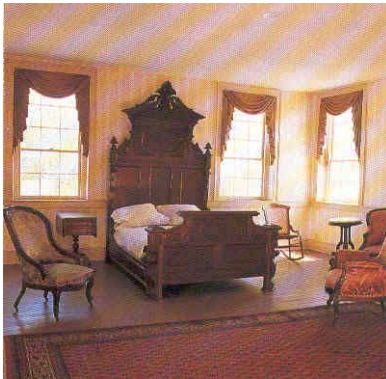
